Exhibitions

Tomi Ungerer. The Tomi Ungerer Museum – International Center for Illustration opened in Strasbourg on 2 November 2007. The museum is housed in the Villa Greiner and presents 8000 drawings, posters and sculptures by the artist along with photographs and media articles in permanent and changing exhibitions.

Friedrich Dürrenmatt's home town of Konolfingen and the surrounding Kiesental region will hold a Friedrich Dürrenmatt Theme Year in 2008. Plans call for numerous activities and include two exhibitions: The Liechti Collection with images, drawings and sketches by Friedrich Dürrenmatt in the Bigla Kulturfabrik in Biglen from 14 March to 1 June 2008, and Konigen -Friedrich Dürrenmatt and his Village in the Dorfmuseum alter Bären in Konolfingen from 18 March to 30 April 2008. In spring 2008, a church window in the Evangelical Reformed Church of Konolfingen will be dedicated. This window is taken from Friedrich Dürrenmatt's picture Apocalypse II: Angel with the Trumpet from the Last Supper. Dürrenmatt's wife Charlotte Kerr gave the picture to the church. Dürrenmatt was born in the church's pastor's residence in 1921.



Sebastian Fink

- 34 years young and thus the youngest police inspector in the Hamburg investigative force
- is neither a pipe smoker nor alcoholic, does not have a special preference for Mediterranean cuisine, nor does he turn around once more when departing to ask »Oh yes, what I still would like to know...«, and yet he still has character.
- has worked his way up through the ranks but not because of his 'career' but rather because he is a driven person: A childhood event won't allow him peace of mind.
- is single, yet, he does not live alone but together with his childhood love, Anna, and her son Leo in a family-like living arrangement.

Friedrich Dönhoff Savoy Blues

Hamburg's youngest police inspector, Sebastian Fink, makes his first steps on the crime scene – still somewhat unsure of himself and all the more charming for that reason.

Summer in Hamburg – and one song is in everyone's ear: *Savoy Blues*. Louis Armstrong's 1930s swing song is the year's number one hit in a cover version from DJ Jack. It can be heard in all of the cafés and from every car. It is even swirling in the ears of the recently graduated head inspector, Sebastian Fink, as he sets out to solve his own first case.

The murder, which he is dealing with, does not appear to be too spectacular at first glance. A retired mailman has been found dead. But what comes out in the course of his investigations is a story deeply rooted in the past – just during that time which enjoys a revival through the summer hit, *Savoy Blues*.

A detective story that comes across as deceptively simple and subtly lures us into the depths of the city on the Alster with its jazzy melancholic melody.







Doris Dörrie, born in Hanover, studied acting and theatre in Stockton, California, and in New York, where she worked part-time as a projectionist at the Goethe Institute. She decided to work behind, and not in front of, the camera. The First Waltz, her finals project for the University of Film in Munich, was screened at various festivals and on television, while Men, her third cinema film, was shown throughout the world. Alongside her work in cinema, she has been described as »one of the best narrative writers of contemporary German literature« (Die Zeit) for her short stories, novels and children's books, for which she has received many awards. Doris Dörrie lives in Munich.

Patricia Highsmith was born in Fort Worth, Texas, in 1921. Her first novel, *Strangers on a Train*, was made into the famous film by Alfred Hitchcock in 1951. *The Talented Mr. Ripley*, published in 1955, was awarded the Edgar Allan Poe Scrolls by the Mystery Writers of America and introduced the fascinating anti-hero Tom Ripley. In February 1995 Patricia Highsmith died in Switzerland, where she resided much of her life. Her work has been published in 35 languages.

A Life Between Athens, Vienna and Istanbul

There is one question that is asked of every author: What is autobiographical in your novels? Petros Markaris answers this question – in his own way. He compares himself with a commissar, sees similarities and differences alike, and gets around to a discussion of his own past: A childhood in Istanbul, everyday life in Athens, collaboration with Theo Angelopoulos, his attachment to the German language and culture. A politically thinking person, such as Petros Markaris, does not limit himself to the autobiographical: When he writes about the Greek community in Istanbul, it is a worthwhile trip to the topic of minorities for him. When he talks about his Armenian roots, the subject is soon homelands. When he describes the creation of his characters Kostas and Adriani, he takes up the themes of equality and political correctness.

It is a playful game of association that the author carries on with himself before the reader's eyes. Autobiographically, historically and politically intermixed in a brilliant and loving way.





Anthony McCarten was born in 1961 at the foot of Mount Taranaki, a volcano near the New Zealand city of New Plymouth. At the age of 25, he co-wrote with his friend Stephen Sinclair the international stage hit Ladies Night (which received the Molière Prize for best foreign play in 2001). Ladies Night has been translated into sixteen languages. Since that time, McCarten has written 11 further theatre plays, poetry, a collection of short stories, three novels and several screenplays (including Via Satellite, also directed by McCarten, which world-premiered in Cannes in 1999). Anthony McCarten lives in Los Angeles, Wellington and the English county of Gloucestershire, where he is currently completing his fourth novel.





Guarnaccia's 14th case and unfortunately his last: A new Nabb masterpiece!

Guarnaccia is called in to handle a murder outside Florence. Signor Paoletti lives in an ostentatiously renovated country estate with his wife, two daughters, his illegitimate grandchild and two household staff members. The oldest daughter, Silvana, has been brutally murdered. For Paoletti, it is clear that it is a case of murder and robbery, but Guarnaccia notices that the details do not match up. With the help of the tabloid journalist Nesti, who still owes him a couple of favours, Guarnaccia finds out that Paoletti owes his fortune to a brief but highly lucrative career as a pimp. This puts Guarnaccia on the alert, of course, because Paoletti is now running a temporary job agency, which imports cheap labour from central and eastern Europe. On the surface, everything is correct: All of the placed cleaning women, gardeners and au pairs have valid passports and visas. But there is something else going on, and this looks entirely different. The case takes such dramatic turns that Guarnaccia submits his resignation from the police force for the first time in his career – to protect himself and his family.

Magdalen Nabb was born in Church, a village in Lancashire, England, in 1947. She studied at the Manchester College of Art, where she began to write. From 1975 onward she lived in Florence, working as a journalist and novelist. Nabb became famous for her Guarnaccia crime novels – she wrote fourteen novels about the crotchety yet likeable Maresciallo – and also wrote books for children and teenagers. Magdalen Nabb died in August 2007.

Alfred A. Häsler The Lifeboat is Full

Das Boot ist voll! (The lifeboat is full!), this sentence was mouthed by many Swiss during the Second World War. Rhetorically garnished, it was an expression of the fear prevailing in much of the Swiss population of an over-alienation of the country through Jewish refugees seeking asylum. This asylum essential for their survival was not granted to the lion's share of those who reached the country.

The journalist and writer Alfred A. Häsler was one of the first to critically examine Switzerland's asylum policy in 1967, and through this opened the eyes of a broad cross-section of the general population to this dark chapter in Swiss history.
