CHARLES JOHN HUFFAM DICKENS (1812–1870) started his professional life as a journalist. In 1836 his first novel *The Pickwick Papers* was published as a newspaper series – and numerous other novels followed. Of his famous characters, *Ebenezer Scrooge* remains so well-known until today that ›a Scrooge‹ became a way of calling a miser and *David Copperfield* had his name re-used by a modern-day stage magician.



SAMUEL LANGHORNE CLEMENS (1835–1910), better known by his pen name Mark Twain, was an American humorist, satirist, lecturer and writer. Twain is most noted for his novels *Adventures of Huckleberry Finn*, which has since been called the *Great American Novel*, and *The Adventures of Tom Sawyer*.

A Sound Like Someone Trying Not to Make a Sound

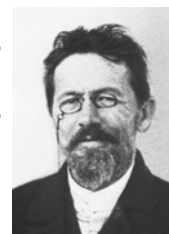

ANTON CHEKHOV (1860–1904) grew up in a poor family with a father who was a strict disciplinarian. The children were made to get out of bed at five o'clock in the morning and were expected to work in the family shop before going to school. Anton, however, was soon to start making his own money: he created stories that were printed in the local newspaper and was thus able to support his family. Later in life, he attended to people in his capacity as a doctor, became a world-famous writer and travelled the world.

The Most Beautiful Tales From the Arabian Nights

For all those who have always shied away from the sheer length of the original, Urs Widmer has carefully abridged the wonderful *Tales from the Arabian Nights* while preserving their oriental flavour. Highly vivid and amusing, he recounts the six most famous tales of the immortal Sheherazade: *The Fisherman and the Djinn*, *Alibaba and the Forty Thieves*, *Aladdin and the Magic Lamp*, *The Magic Horse*, *The Adventures of Harun al-Rashid*, and *Sinbad the Sailor*.

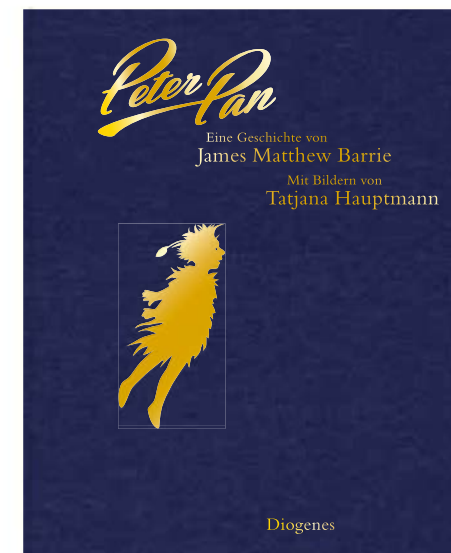


THEODOR STORM (1817–1888), poet and writer of novellas including *Immensee* and *The Rider on the White Horse*, was one of the leading representatives of poetic realism and one of the most popular writers of his day. Alongside his literary activity, he continued to work as a lawyer all his life. Theodor Storm wrote the story of *Little John* in 1849 for his eldest son, Hans.
